

Year 10 – IT Systems, Homework and Changing Options

Dear Year 10 Parents/ Guardians,

I hope that your child's first couple of weeks at Gillotts School have been enjoyable ones despite or the challenges posed by the Coronavirus pandemic. We are very pleased with the start that Year 10 have made to the new school year.

I am writing to provide you with information about two key elements which support the learning process: our IT systems and homework. I will also provide you with details of how your child may change an option subject if they are considering doing so.

I. IT Systems

BYOD

As you will know from the information you received from us before your child joined the school, we require all students to bring a mobile device into school to support teaching and learning. This would, in normal circumstances, bring significant additional opportunities because students can make use of their device to connect to the internet as and when they need to:

- Online quizzes for immediate feedback on learning
- Accessing shared lesson and homework resources in Google Classroom
- Photographing/videoing practical work
- Research
- Accessing specific learning resources, e.g. Maths Watch and Vocab Express
- Accessing GCSE past papers and mark schemes

However, the changes which we have had to make to how the school is organised and how children learn as a result of the Coronavirus pandemic has meant that mobile devices are even more important than usual. Almost all assessed work will be completed and submitted electronically. This work will then be marked online by teachers and returned to the students on their devices.

It is therefore essential that your child has a fully charged mobile device in school every day and has access to a fixed computer or mobile device at home. Bearing in mind that the students will be completing work on this device we are strongly recommending that this device has a larger screen than a mobile device – e.g. a Chromebook, laptop or iPad.

Our IT Services team will be spending the next week ensuring that all students are connected to the school wifi system. This is a filtered system which means that students cannot access inappropriate website. Our BYOD Code of Conduct (attached) requires students to use the wifi when in school. If your child is still having problems getting connected, they can contact our IT Services for support by following the instructions on the IT summary document which is also attached to this e-mail. This summary also outlines the key Google applications which our students use and provides links to introductory videos on each of these.

Google Classroom

Google Classroom is a very important application which allows teachers to set work and share resources with the students in their class. It also allows students to complete the work online and submit it to their teachers for marking and feedback.

Although students will be required to write the details of homework set in their Student Planners, the homework itself will be set on Google Classroom. It is therefore essential that your child understands how to use it. If s/he is unsure, please watch through the instruction video with them. If they still need help, they should discuss this with their form tutor.

2. Homework

We believe that homework is a very important part of the learning process. This is, in part, to support the teaching and learning which takes place in school. It also helps our students develop the independent learning skills that will support them in their post-16 studies and adult life.

Homework is set according to a homework timetable and is recorded in the Student Planner. The details which your child should record include:

- description of the task
- date the task was set
- date when it is due
- initials of the teacher who has set the homework

The homework itself and any resources required to complete it will be posted by your child's teacher on Google Classroom. The students will receive a notification of this in their e-mail in box and will also be able to see it in the class folders in Google Classroom. It is important that your child follows the instructions given by their teacher.

It is an absolute requirement that homework is completed and submitted on the deadline set. The expectation is that students spend around 2 hours per night on homework in Year 10.

The table below shows the number of times homework should be set in each subject per fortnight and the approximate time it should take:

| | Year 11 | Weekly | 1 hour per week |

Your child should know which class they are in for each subject as this is recorded on the front of their exercise books and on the printed copy of their timetable which has been stuck in their planner. If they are still unsure, please contact your child's tutor who will be able to help. Please can you also sign your child's planner weekly as part of this process.

3. Changing Options

While the vast majority of students will be happy with the option choices they have made, there is usually a small number of students who would like to make a change. It is important to consider this decision carefully and your child should have a discussion with their tutor in the first instance. The deadline for changing option is the end of this half term.

We normally run a 'Welcome to GCSE Evening' in the School Hall where we provide information about the two year GCSE courses – including details of key milestones and events. We will be running this as an online event this year and further details will be coming out shortly.
