Brighter Careers Coaching

Brighter Careers is our external careers individual advice and guidance (IAG) provider which delivers 1:1 interviews with you during Years 9 to 11. Our adviser, Charlotte Van der Berghen, will help you explore the necessary requirements for successful application for post-16 education and apprenticeships. She will also direct you to the latest labour market information. You will be provided with an individual action plan that will help you make successful post-16 applications.

Outline of Careers PSHE Days

Year 7

- How much?: Explore on-line resources, discover labour markets, job profiles and the pathway students might want to take for future employment. Meet careers advisor, Charlotte Van der Berghen and learn about what she does and explore some career websites together.
- What's School all about?: Explore the personal and social skills students have, how they are used within education and employment and how students might develop them during their time at Gillotts and in the future.
 - ❖ The Quandary: Explore the importance of transferable skills within education and the workplace. What will students need to do to be successful in 2030 and beyond?

Year 8

- **Stereotypes**: What stereotypes exist in the workplace and who might influence students' choice of employment? Students listen to a talk by a former CID detective on stereotypes and adversity in the workplace and how much things have changed.
- ❖ **No Barriers, No excuses:** What skills and qualities will students need to develop to overcome stereotypes and land their dream jobs?
- Post-16: Students are introduced to their options post-16; A-levels, T-levels, vocational courses and T-levels. Students explore various sixth form and college resources.

Year 9

- Options choices: Explore options at GCSE and how students' choices may affect their pathways for post-16, higher education and future education. Students will be signposted to all the relevant websites to help them make informed decisions. Students will fill in a draft electronic options form.
- Career Bites: Students receive short talks from two professionals about their career (photographer/NHS/cybersecurity/scientist/lawyer)
- Post-16 talk: Students listen to a talk by Piggott Sixth Form linked to post-16 options

Year 10

- ❖ You're Hired: The mock interview day is all about students and what makes them stand out from the crowd. They will prepare a CV, submit it to an employer, work on interview techniques and participate in an interview with a local professional. Students will receive verbal and written feedback about the quality of their CV and interview.
- Evaluating Performance: Students receive structured written feedback following their interview and use this to make improvements to their CV and make a note of ways to improve for their next interview.
- Managing your money: Students learn all about the finances of salaries, properties, bills and money choices.

Year II

❖ **Taster day:** Students attend a local sixth form provider and participate in taster sessions of subjects they are interested in taking at post 16. This gives them an opportunity to finalise their courses or further explore other options in preparation for their applications.
